The Galway City Museum houses the oldest known Claddagh Ring, crafted around 1700 by Richard Joyce, a slave-turned-silversmith from Galway. Having been made and worn in Galway for over 300 years, the Claddagh Ring symbolises the city and Irish identity worldwide, especially among the Irish Diaspora.

Born by the docks in Galway in 1882, Patrick Joseph Conroy (Pádraic Ó Conaire) became the most important Irish-language writer of his generation. When he died in 1928, the Gaelic League commissioned Dublin sculptor Albert Power to create a memorial statue. Unveiled in Evre Square in 1935, it quickly became a Galway landmark. The statue was beheaded in 1999 and afterwards moved into Galway City Museum for safekeeping. A bronze replica now sits in its place in Eyre Square.

Galway City Council is currently undertaking a vernacular heritage survey of Ballindooley. Join us for a walking tour of Ballindooley / Baile an Dúlaigh to meet the project consultants, discover the unique aspects of vernacular heritage, learn about how the survey is being carried out, and how you can research your own area or building. The Galway City Council Biodiversity Officer will also be there to discuss how vernacular buildings and landscapes supports our flora and fauna.

Made around 1710 and presented to Galway by Mayor Edward Eyre, the Great Mace is an ornate silver piece decorated with the insignia of England, France, Scotland, Ireland, as well as the arms of Galway and the British royal family. Owned by US newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst from the 1930s to 1950s, it was returned to Galway in 1961.
